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#### **Teacher Tales**

#### Stick to the Routine

Teachers love routine. Students love routine once they own it. The class routine is the foundation of a focused and energetic class. In orchestra, the students follow certain steps to prepare for the rehearsal of music. The routine is as follows: unpack the instrument (violin, viola, cello or bass), sit down, open the case, check to make sure your music is on the music stand, rosin up your bow, check your tuning and go! Teamwork is achieved with this approach to middle school orchestra.

It's April 1992 when all my 8th graders are working their way through a morning class. It's amazing how serious they became closer to the end of the year, with visions of high school! These were my experts and they had almost 3 years of prepping for class. They were working well together and preparing for their Final Spring Orchestra Concert.

On that particular morning they followed the routine in a normal fashion. Except for one student named Peter. Peter always seemed sleepy in the early class, and he asked me if he could sit out. I asked him if he needed the nurse, and he replied in the negative. Therefore, the sleepy head went to the back of the cello section and sat on the carpeted floor, as per my instructions.

"To begin class, let's play through the concert music" are my directions and so the music starts. They play the music resolutely and quickly. Regular rehearsal always leads to a familiar performance. It is routine, by 8th grade, to avoid stopping and only fix mistakes after the music is complete. Perhaps we were timing the music to know the length of the upcoming concert? It seems like a routine day....

Meanwhile, my eyes glance over at Peter. And, within about 5 minutes, he is snoozing on the floor, flat on his back...like it's naptime. This is a little annoying to me since it was not part of the routine. Well, no worries, just concentrate on the students who are rehearsing the music, I say to myself.

5 minutes later - I glance over toward Peter and notice what looks like a small snake near his head?? So, the empty space in my stomach gets bigger and my heartbeat is quicker! But that couldn't be a snake, as my arms are continuing to whirl through the conducting pattern. If I stop conducting the music, what will happen? How could this be?? Surely, it was a rubber snake that Peter had put there to scare me! It must be a prank.... the sleepy head with April Fools ideas still on his mind! Also, I am not in a condition to accept jokes about snakes, with my first child due in 3 months!!!

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Glancing again and focusing more on the "rubber snake", my neck tightens. My mind races, did my eyes deceive me? Then, I see a snake tongue wiggling from the snake's head, inches from Peter's sleepy head. Could it be real?? It's NOT rubber? Why doesn't Peter wake up? Is this really happening? Just call Peter's name softly over the music and get him to wake up!! "Peter, Peter"? Goodness gracious, how do I stop the music and get Peter to move away from the snake!!???

By this time the students were looking strangely up at me while playing music but trying to read my lips. The concertmaster (1st violin) momentarily pauses her bow, and she says." Mrs. Rooker, what is the matter?" Finally, I blurted out the words that were hammering in my head..." THERE'S A SNAKE IN THE CLASSROOM! PETER GET UP!"

In less than 2 seconds, the entire orchestra class is on their feet and headed for the door with their instruments! It is a very different musical evacuation! (During fire-drill we never carry the instruments). We all arrive in the hallway with no line-up, slamming the door behind us!! Then the questions weigh in! "Peter, was that a real snake next to your head? Whose snake is that??" "How did a snake get in the orchestra room?" And the students are cooing "Mrs. Rooker are you OK?" "Peter, it didn't bite you, did it?" LOL! Peter, "No, I was asleep".

One student calmly says, "That's Ms. Brown's baby king snake, it got out of its glass tank and was not there during homeroom this morning!" Me: "Well, get over there to Ms. Brown's classroom and tell her to come immediately and get this snake OUT of the ORCHESTRA ROOM!" Then laughter ensues. Ms. Brown arrives, smiling and saying "I wonder how my poor baby got way over here to the orchestra room? Are you all OK?". Thankfully, she removed our uninvited reptilian audience member without a rehearsal ticket.

Looking back, class routine and focus carried the day! We were so involved in the music class rehearsal that we never noticed Ms. Brown's snake, until Peter started snoozing. We were all happy that the snake belonged in the science classroom and not in a violin case! "Stick to the Routine" has been a treasured teacher tale for many years.
